2013 Open Enrollment

Enrollment for 2013 opens July 1, 2013 and will remain open through September 1, 2013.

Why should your family members be enrolled?

Being enrolled with Seldovia Village Tribe has many benefits for programs available to Alaskan Natives. Being enrolled in your Tribe can help with housing needs, low income energy heating assistance program, scholarships, and much more. Below is the definition of eligible membership Tribal from SVT's Enrollment Ordinance.

Section 6 ~ SVT Enrollment Ordinance: Any blood descendent of any person who was originally enrolled to the Native Village of Seldovia -under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

Health Reform Makes <u>Tribal</u> <u>Enrollment Essential</u>!

Under the Affordable Care Act every American must demonstrate health care coverage in the coming year. This means if you do not already have coverage (e.g., Medicaid, Medicare, Denali KidCare or private insurance) you will be required to purchase health insurance or face a penalty when filing your taxes. The tax penalty could be as much as \$695 per adult and \$347.50 per child.

Alaska Native and American Indian people are exempt from the requirement to purchase insurance if they can show evidence of being enrolled in a federally recognized tribe.

Even with this exemption, Alaska Native and American Indian people may choose to purchase insurance. Alaskans will have a new option of purchasing health insurance through the federal marketplace as early as October 2013 for plan coverage effective January 1, 2014. Some Alaskans will

qualify for premium subsidies based on income. For instance, an individual earning up to \$57,400 or a family of four earning up to \$117,760 may receive financial assistance when purchasing insurance.

2013 Marine Science Workshop

The fourth annual Tribal Marine Science Workshop was held at the NOAA/UAF Kasitsna Bay

Laboratory. The intensive workshop is designed for natural resource specialists in Alaska Tribes and Native organizations who have an interest in marine sciences, and/or who have responsibilities for managing marine resources adjacent to their communities.

The program incorporated classroom lectures and numerous field trips to the highly productive and diverse habitats of Kachemak Bay, and included presentations on traditional knowledge and uses of marine recourses; the ecology of marine plants, invertebrates, fish, and marine mammal species commonly used for subsistence by Alaska Natives; contaminants in subsistence marine resources and concepts of physical oceanography that may be important for monitoring the marine environment affecting Alaska's coastal communities.
